## **Data Considerations for the SDGs**

In 2018, Social Justice Ireland released two research publications on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) – the <u>Sustainable Progress Index Measuring Progress: Economy, Society and Environment in Ireland</u> and <u>Ireland vs EU28: Measuring Ireland's Progress towards Achieving the SDGs</u>. The objectives of our research were twofold: (i) to provide an analysis of Ireland's track record in achieving the SDGS over time and (ii) to understand Ireland's performance on the SDGs in an EU context. Based on our experience, the following are some comments and suggestions on data collection for the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). We believe the monitoring of the SDGs would benefit if consideration is given to these improvements in data collection and availability.

The main difficulty we encountered in our research was the unavailability of data on indicators to enable analysis *over time*, and in particular, over the *longer-term*. Also, in some cases, the latest available data was quite old - 2012 or 2013. In both instances, this implied comparisons with other countries, and over time, were hampered. Clearly, more data is becoming available in recent years, facilitating analysis of the performance of the SDGs in the short-term (3-5 years) and commentary on the achievements of the objectives of the SDGs. But there are still gaps, and *indicators need to be available on a regular (annual) basis*. The following are some suggestions for data improvements that would facilitate more effective and comprehensive commentary.
