

Older people live alone in homes with four rooms or less

Housing and living conditions



- The housing crisis impacts older people as well as other age groups.
- The grant system in place does not adequately support older people whose homes are not suitable for them to enable them to stay at home.

HaPai data identified;

- One quarter (25%) reported having difficulties associated with housing maintenance
- One-fifth (20 %) reported having housing facility problems

Applying this information to the population projections issued by the CSO, in 2016, 234,848 people aged 55 and over were experiencing housing facility problems and 113,453 are experiencing problems with housing conditions.

Health Home Supports & the ability to age in place



- Nursing homes and hospital stays are not an inevitable part of ageing.
- Older people unnecessarily take up space in hospitals and A&E departments because the system has not adapted.
- Loneliness is a health issue.

Reclaiming the narrative and minding our language

- Is there a pensions time bomb.
- The State pension can't cover all your costs as you get older.

Reality

Gross Public Pensions: going from 5.1% of GDP in 2020, peaking at 7.4% in 2050, down to 6.6% in 2070

Age-related spending: going from 15% of GDP in 2020, peaking at 20% in 2060, down to 19.3% in 2070








Supporting older people to age at home



- Better access to information on technology that can support needs
- Families better equipped to support older relatives
- Older people have more choice in technologies available to them
- People supported to live more independently



- Better management of own health and wellbeing
- Supported timely discharges from hospital
- Preventing re-admission to hospital
- Better information sharing between the health and community sector



Bodies

- Better insight into property management and maintenance
- Introduction of AI to alert to concerning behaviour












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
